

Personally, the biggest event for me was attendance at the International Network for Philosophy and Psychiatry's (INPP) conference in Dallas, Texas, towards the end of 2008. This combined some fascinating talks on topics ranging from values to freedom, from ageing to Asperger's, from Aristotle to Frege, with a highly memorable feast (there was no other word for it), with demonstrations of cow-herding, at a working Texan ranch, all brilliantly organized by Professor John Sadler. And already the next INPP conference in Lisbon is upon us. It will be but a moment until the 2010 conference, which is planned for Manchester. The University of Central Lancashire (UCLAN) was very well represented in Texas. Call for Abstracts - 22nd Annual Meeting May 22 & 23, 2010 New Orleans, LA Theme: PHILOSOPHICAL ISSUES IN EVIDENCE-BASED PSYCHIATRY Conference Co-Chairs:

The movement toward Evidence-Based Psychiatry has generated a broad range of philosophical, ethical, and practical challenges. As a medical discipline charged with diagnosing, preventing, and treating mental disorders, psychiatry depends on established knowledge and emerging empirical data from the neurosciences, genetics, psychology, and other areas of scientific inquiry. Evidence-Based Psychiatry (EBP) refers to the application of well-supported scientific knowledge to clinical problems affecting mind, brain, and behavior. EBP provides a framework for integrating the current best evidence, clinical expertise and patient values and preferences into clinical practice. A plethora of conceptual and practical questions underlie EBP:

- Can psychiatrists use empirical data alone to select the best diagnostic constructs?
- Can evidence for psychiatric treatments be trusted when much of it comes from data obtained by clinical researchers and pharmaceutical companies with a financial stake in the outcome of the studies they conduct?
- What happens when expertise conflicts with patient values and preferences?

This conference will consider these and related controversies in current psychiatric research and practice. Papers pertaining to Evidence-Based Psychiatry and Evidence-Based Practice in clinical and counseling psychology are welcome.

Possible topics include, but are not limited to:

- What counts as valid evidence for making diagnostic and treatment decisions?
- Can clinical expertise be empirically-based?
- Do political and moral issues affect the definition of successful treatment outcome?
- What are the ethical issues in the use of treatment manuals/algorithms?

- If the best current evidence pertains primarily to patients with single disorders, how should the scientifically –informed clinician respond to multiple, complex, co-morbid disorders?
- What is the relationship between science and humanism in EBP?
- Does 'best evidence' vary across cultures?
- How do guild interests (psychiatry versus psychology) influence the articulation of standards of care?

Presentations will be strictly limited to 20 minutes, followed by 10 minutes for discussion. Abstracts will be blind reviewed, so the author's identifying information should be attached separately. Abstracts should be 500-600 words and should be sent via email by November 15, 2009 to both <u>dbrendel@partners.org</u> and <u>pzachar@aum.edu</u>. Notices of acceptance or rejection will be distributed in early January.

Philosophy of mental health at the University of Central Lancashire

The University of Central Lancashire's *Institute for Philosophy, Diversity and Mental Health* is committed to an international programme of research and teaching. As part of the newly established *International School for Communities, Rights and Inclusion*, led by Lord Kamlesh Patel of Bradford, the Institute aims to bring a new dynamism and cooperation to the University's work in community engagement, social inclusion, equality and human rights, supported by high level philosophical and conceptual analysis. It aims to be:

- research-led, drawing particularly on the resources of philosophy;
- practically focused, contributing to public policy, training and service developments that support user and community engagement, equality and social inclusion, within diverse communities; and
- international in scope, working in partnership with the International Network for Philosophy and Psychiatry, and a wide international network of researchers, service users and practitioners of mental health, illness and recovery.

Why Philosophy?

Mental health raises conceptual as well as empirical difficulties; philosophy offers tools to provide conceptual clarification of key issues. Philosophical approaches to mind and meaning, values and ethics, science and knowledge will inform research into the nature of mental health and illness, mental health care, and the central roles and experiences of service users.

Why Diversity?

Increasingly our society is multi-ethnic and multi-cultural. Mass migration, economic change and new information technologies have focused attention on respect for diversity throughout society. This demands positive engagement with the diversity of individual experiences diversity in relation to gender, age, religion, language, sexuality and other features of human experience. The Institute's resources of philosophy, such as values-based practice, support research and service development that are responsive to the full diversity of individual user's needs, beliefs and experiences.

Why International?

Historically, one of the barriers to developing services that are genuinely responsive to the diversity of user experience has been the dominance of particular models of mental health care and recovery. The Institute is developing a rich international network of partners among service users, researchers and policy-makers, as the basis for a dynamic process of shared learning, drawing on the range of philosophical traditions found in different parts of the world.

The Philosophy and Mental Health teaching programme

The Institute runs a Post-Graduate Certificate, Diploma and Masters course in Philosophy and Mental Health. It is:

- based on the newly published Oxford Textbook of Philosophy and Psychiatry
- conducted by distance learning to fit with the busy working lives of those in the field
- led by internationally recognised leaders in the field
- run from starting dates in October and January

Mental health care is in a state of flux. The rise of user-centred care, developments in models of diagnosis and increasingly sophisticated tools to guide values-based practice have all changed the intellectual and policy landscape. The programme in Philosophy and Mental Health critically examines the assumptions that drive the agenda in mental health care. It aims to foster analytic and argumentative skills in its students in order for them to have a theoretically informed understanding of mental health to enhance their professional practice. It also provides a stepping-stone for students to carry out original research and participate in changing this developing field.

Expanding the influence of Philosophy and Mental Health in South-Eastern Europe: a report from the Balkan Academy of PPP Assoc. Prof. Drozdstoj Stoyanov, MD, PhD

President of the Academy, Deputy Director of the University Centre for Philosophy and Mental Health, Plovdiv

In the period 2008-2009, as a result of international efforts and hard work, the field of Philosophy and Mental Health in South-Eastern Europe has grown in terms of its influence. The most significant event to be recorded was the Second International Symposium on Philosophy, Psychiatry & Psychology (PPP) organized by the Balkan Academy of PPP (*BAPPP*)–INPP, the University Centre for Philosophy and Mental Health (*UCPMH*), University of Plovdiv and the Sofia University Clinical and Counseling Psychology Program. This was held in Sofia University on May 22d 2009. We are grateful for the endorsement of the International Network of Philosophy and Psychiatry (INPP) for this enterprise.

- Ahead to the Second International Symposium. UCPMH published in collaboration with BAPPP a collection of **Archives of Philosophy and Mental Health** (2008-2009).
- Next on the list was the visit of Giovanni Stanghellini. Professor Stanghellini was welcomed in the University of Plovdiv on June 29th 2009 for his inauguration with the degree of *Doctor Honoris Causa*. During the ceremony he presented a lecture entitled "*The Psychopathological interview: a philosophical problem*". Prof. Stanghellini has also been a guest of the Faculty of Public Health at the University of Medicine in Plovdiv where he conducted most fruitful conversations with the academic management.
- Establishment of mutual agreement contacts between FPH (Plovdiv) and ISCRI (UCLan). On July 7th 2009 there was initiated a meeting with Prof. Lord Patel of Bradford, OBE which was organized in Preston, UK. Prof. Stoyanov was authorized as a special Deputy on international affairs for the Dean of the Faculty of Public Health in the Medical University of Plovdiv, Professor Jeliazko Hristov. Prof. Lord Patel of Bradford represented the University of Central Lancashire as Head of its International School of Communities, Rights and Inclusion. Professors Bill Fulford and Christopher Heginbotham also attended this meeting as Co-Directors of the Institute for Philosophy, Diversity and Mental Health at ISCRI. The participants agreed on the following agenda for cooperation:
 - 1. A joint research programme between the UK and Bulgaria focussing on community engagement with minority communities;
 - 2. An educational programme with the Faculty of Public Health on healthcare management, public health policy and social care management with a focus on diversity and inequalities in public health; and
 - 3. A joint conference on philosophy and multi-cultural, cross-national determinants of public health, to be held in Bulgaria in the autumn 2010.
- Approval of the MA in Philosophy and Mental Health on July 20th 2009. The program was designed by members of Expert Board of UCPMH and ratified successfully by the Academic Board of the University. This is the fifth program worldwide, after the Universities of Warwick, Essex, King's College, and Central Lancashire in UK.
- WPA regional meeting in St. Petersburg 2010: Symposium entitled "Epistemology and Methodology of psychiatry". Co-sponsored by the WPA Section on Philosophy and Humanities (Chairpersons: Prof. Bill Fulford, Prof. Giovanni Stanghellini).
 Further development of the UCPMH. In February 2009, the first Director of the Centre, Ivan Hristov, resigned. The Board elected in his position Professors Ognyan Saparev and Drozdstoj Stoyanov as Deputy Director. After its establishment in 2008, UCPMH developed a wide range of non-formal task forces and special interest groups on different items of the PPP agenda.

Last but not least, we were honored with the academic endorsement of the Philosophy SIG of the RSPsych for our application before the National Science Trust, aimed at further expansion of the Network under a novel Integrative Inter-University Centre for Philosophy, Ethics and Mental Health.
